#### **INTRODUCTION**

The deficiencies in WASH services extend beyond basic water access, affecting hygiene practices, sanitation, and healthcare waste management. "In 1 in 5 facilities globally, basic water services are lacking, impacting 22% of them, with 857 million people having no access to water in healthcare settings. Furthermore, half of these facilities lack fundamental hygiene services, raising concerns for the care provided to 3.85 billion people". The gaps in sanitation and healthcare waste management are equally alarming, emphasizing the urgent need for targeted interventions[1].

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development Goal 6, <a href="https://sdgs.un.org/goals">https://sdgs.un.org/goals</a> aims to 'ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all' and includes targets for universal access to safe drinking water (6.1), and sanitation and hygiene (6.2).[2]

Access to clean water, proper sanitation, and effective hygiene practices are vital components of public health and well-being. Recognizing the significance of Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) is crucial in promoting global health security and sustainable development. By prioritizing WASH/IPC initiatives, nations can contribute to disease prevention, child health, community well-being, economic growth, and gender equality, ultimately fostering healthier and more resilient societies.

#### What does ACHAP aim to achieve?

- Enhanced WASH outcomes in Healthcare Facilities (HCFs).
- Reduction in maternal, newborn, and child mortality and morbidity rates.
- Eradication of illnesses associated with inadequate WASH conditions.
- Enhancement of community knowledge, attitudes, and practices regarding appropriate WASH protocols leading to improved Household WASH conditions.

# **Advocacy**

- Securing financing and budgetary inclusion for WASH activities in National Budgets.
- Mobilizing donor funding for WASH-related activities.
- Empowering communities to demand high-quality WASH services at Healthcare Facilities (HCFs).
- Advocating for enhanced WASH governance and accountability.
- Facilitating networking opportunities for CHAs to connect with professionals, organizations, and stakeholders in the WASH/IPC domain.

# **Capacity Building and Training.**

- Conducting training sessions for Healthcare Workers and support staff, including cleaners.
- Providing training for CHA staff in WASH data management. (for example, the mWater training).
- Strengthening the capacity of Community Health Workers to address their respective communities' WASH needs. (their role as role models and community champions in advocating and ensuring safe and proper WASH/infection prevention and control practices at the health facilities, reducing the potential spread of infections/diseases especially for mothers expecting to deliver at the linked facilities. They also promote the availability of handwashing stations with soap and water in the households they support).
- Distributing WASH/IPC related resources such as Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials.

# **Community WASH**

- Community Led Total Sanitation.
- Participatory Hygiene and Sanitation Transformation (PHAST)
- Children's Hygiene and Sanitation Training (CHAST)
- Basic WASH facilities and Ideal WASH practices at household level (These practices include using safe drinking water, washing hands with soap and water at key times, safe disposal of excreta, proper solid and liquid waste management, and food hygiene)

#### WASH in HCFs.

- WASH conditions assessment in Healthcare Facilities.
- Procurement and distribution of WASH/IPC supplies.
- Capacity strengthening for HCWs and cleaners on WASH/IPC standards.
